FROM PARISH NURSE DIANA SAUM, RN: Plantar fasciitis (pronounced Plan-tarfash-ee-eye-tis) is a common cause of foot and heel pain in

adults. A common symptom of plantar fasciitis is heel pain first thing in the morning on arising.

The plantar fascia runs from the insertion site in heel along the bottom of our foot and supports your arch as the plantar fascia pulls on the heel it can become inflamed. Your body responds by laying down more bone creating a heel spur.


Common causes are progressive flattening of the arch overtime, lack of flexibility in the calf muscle, change in activity levels, overuse, and weight gain. When your arch drops, the plantar fascia begins to tear away from its insertion at the heel.

If left alone plantar fasciitis can take 6-18 mos. to heal. Treatment can help shorten recovery time. Two main concepts in treatment are: the decrease of inflammation and addressing the cause of the condition. Stretching and exercises help to lessen the pull on your heel; anti-inflammatory agents including ice and oral anti-inflammatory; night splints to prevent contraction of plantar fascia and to maintain calf flexibility; corticosteroid injections may help especially if anti-inflammatories don't work; surgery to release pressure on plantar fascia; and foot orthotics designed to correct pull on plantar fascia.
